Entreamigos is a cultural and community bridge that provides educational opportunities for the children and families of San Pancho.

2012. Year in Review.

2012 was another year of tremendous growth for Entreamigos. Much like children that grow into new clothes, we felt ourselves discovering the value of our huge facility, expanding our services and increasing our capacity in nearly every aspect of our activities. More classes, more education, more activities, more events, more business and more people.

In 2012 we pushed hard to finish project spaces such as the Talleres (adult workshop spaces) and the Ludoteca (play space for young children) which had only been dreams in the first years of use of the new facility. We began to imagine 2013 and the programs and impact that those new spaces would bring to the San Pancho community.

In 2012 we solidified and expanded our Board of Directors, inviting new members and San Pancho residents, Tom Leach and Bill Roberts to join us in directing and guiding the future of Entreamigos. And in 2012 we saw our very first scholarship student off to college. It was a moment of triumph and tears and an opportunity to validate the hard work and dedication of the Entreamigos community in bringing education and opportunity to the life of this young adult and the many that will soon follow.

The success of the Entreamigos education center received formal recognition from Ana Lilia Lopez de Sandoval, the wife of the Governor of Nayarit, when she visited the facility and noted the spectacular accomplishments of the organization and expressed interest in seeing our model duplicated throughout the State of Nayarit.

Entreamigos also received an exciting international spotlight when we were selected by the World Economic Forum to be the only break-out session off-site hosts for the 2012 gathering in Puerto Vallarta. Entreamigos led the 40 Young Global Leaders in a community forum style conversation that included local San Pancho business, environmental and education leaders in a discussion about the effects and benefits of globalization on a small community.

In summary, 2012 represented an expansion of programs and services, national and international recognitions and continued growth into our role as a pillar, nexus and stabilizing force in the San Pancho community.

Impact 2012: Education. The Scholarship program.

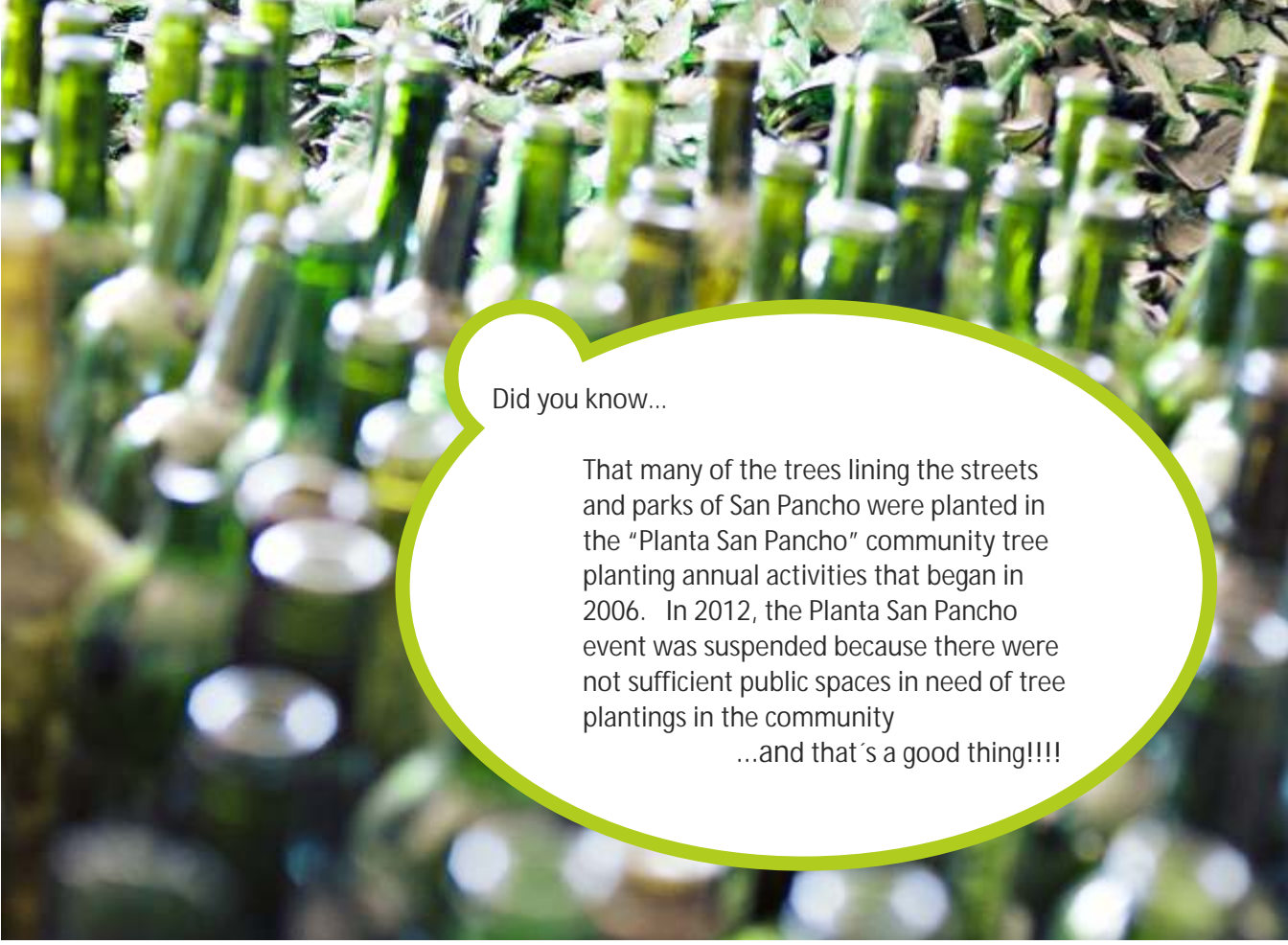
The scholarship program is one of the accomplishments of entreamigos of which we are most proud. Under the leadership of Paulina Lua, the continuity in educational and social support provided to scholarship families has kept children in school and has created a strong bond of trust and appreciation among scholarship students, parents and the entreamigos community.

Cost of Education. How the entreamigos scholarship program supports students.

The entreamigos scholarship program is designed to support each child in the manner and at the level that they most need it. Scholarship support for each child is different. Scholarship students come from a range of economic situations and the scholarship program attempts to meet a child and a family where they most need it. In some cases, children receive uniforms, school supplies, backpacks, payments of school fees, transportation costs and additional food or economic support. In other cases, the family will cover some of these costs and entreamigos will support them when and where they fall short. Our close ties in the community allow entreamigos to adapt to the real needs of each child and ensures that their education is always a priority. Scholarship funds are also used to help cover some of the program costs related to supporting these kids and all kids in school. The scholarship program supports the after-school tutoring program, school related special projects, and some library programs.





Did you know...

That many of the trees lining the streets and parks of San Pancho were planted in the "Planta San Pancho" community tree planting annual activities that began in 2006. In 2012, the Planta San Pancho event was suspended because there were not sufficient public spaces in need of tree plantings in the community

Impact. Environment

Entreamigos believes that a healthy, clean environment is the foundation for a strong and vibrant community. The integration of environmental practices such as recycling, town cleanups and community beautification projects within entreamigos general educational practices is a critical aspect of our development and sustainability strategy.

The entreamigos facility is a reflection of our commitment to the environment and is a model for environmental design that has become a must see destination for Mexican and international environmental enthusiasts, dignitaries and designers.

Impact: Community and Culture.

Entreamigos has become a thriving education and cultural space that builds community connections through the sharing of our collective resources, education and cultural diversity.

The opportunity to become an active and integral part in the development of a community that is bilingual, bicultural and constantly changing is one of the critical strengths of entreamigos. In 2012 we began to serve an even greater San Pancho audience by offering trips and tours, movie nights and slideshows, healthcare conferences, security meetings, gallery showings as well as a host of community and cultural events. Entreamigos is a true community center that serves as a nexus point, meeting space and educational resource for all residents and visitors to San Pancho.

San Pancho, a model for the world.

In 2012, entreamigos was selected to host a breakout session of the World Economic Forum. The session was titled, “Globalization in the context of a small community” and was focused on understanding the rapid changes and globalization that is challenging the community of San Pancho. The 40 guests of the World Economic Forum included some of the most respected emerging world leaders of our time including:

The gathering was facilitated by entreamigos staff and volunteers, hosted by San Pancho residents and businesses for a tour of the community. Community participants included business owner Horatio Ruiz(Latcho), Martin the fisherman, Miguel the painter, Rodrigo Ballestar, Cori Jacobs, Rick Kahn and mexican environmentalists Erik Saracho (Alianza Jaguar) and Luis Morales (Birding San Pancho). La Patrona Polo Club and several others hosted the group as we worked to share a collective conversation about education, sustainability and the environment.

The leaders recognized and congratulated San Pancho as a community model in the context of globalization. Many suggested that the integrated methods of community building and community care were like few communities that they had ever visited.

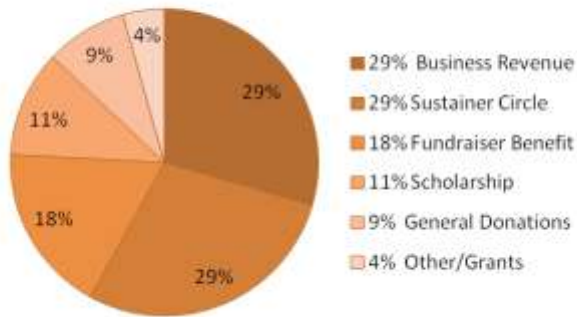

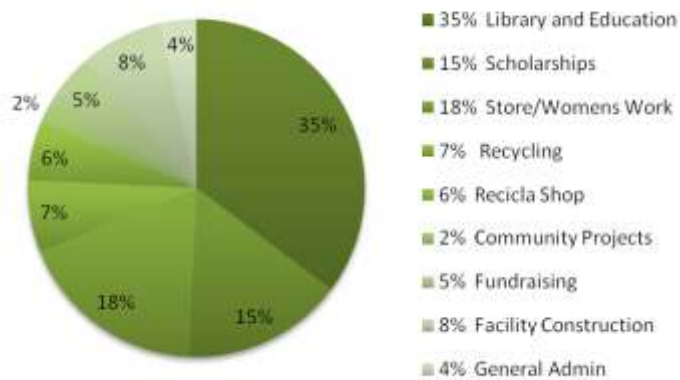
